How Many More Young Evangelists Will God Raise Up from This Year's Summer Bible Camp Season?

Camp Ministry Hit Record Impact in 2022 . . . But the Need Grows

We are preparing for 2023 Summer Bible Camp ministry with great hope. In 2022, by God's grace and provision shown through your partnership, more than 50,000 children were assisted in attending **Summer Bible Camp** offered by local churches supported by SGA. This was a 25 percent increase over the previous year!

Even more stunning is that more than **7,000** children made professions of faith in Christ, and **11,156** children desire to come to church. That is double from last year, and reflects some **140 percent growth over the past five years!** We expect that final numbers will be even higher, as there were camp sessions that were delayed due to the invasion in Ukraine and its related impacts. But the Lord is moving in many young lives, and for that, may He be praised!

This included a 30 percent increase in the number of children from **unbelieving homes.** We assisted 800 churches in 10 former Soviet countries in holding 704 camps, which is tremendous growth over the past five years!

A Seven-Year-Old Evangelist

In **Belarus's Grodno region**, Pastor Alexander shared the story of one young boy who proved to be an eager witness for Christ:

Danik is seven years old and attends Sunday school. He was at his grandmother's during summer vacation in a town where most of the residents are former military. When Danik was playing outside with others, he would drop out of the game and run up to passersby, taking them by the hand and retelling what he had memorized from the Bible camp.

He told them God loves people, that God is always there, and invited them to a prayer group. **His** grandmother later said that there had never been so

many new people at a group as there had been that month. The other children told us the story rather than Danik himself. We later asked Danik how he decided to whom he would speak. With childlike simplicity, he replied, "They were very sad. I didn't want them to go to Hell!" The theme of the camp had been "You're Not Alone."

This is a beautiful affirmation of the work God is doing in the midst of all the turmoil in this present world. As Job reverently declared . . . *I know that You can do all things, and that no purpose of Yours can be thwarted* (Job 42:2). Even in the aftermath of a tragic pandemic and an ongoing, horrible war, the Lord continues to build His kingdom.

As we prepare for yet another **Summer Bible Camp** season beginning this June, please pray in advance for the children who will attend and for the churches holding the camps. May God be glorified in the bountiful fruit! •

There are literally hundreds of people groups across vast Russia, and one of them is known as the Roma—who are commonly called gypsies across Eastern Europe, but the Roma consider that very offensive. Poverty is rampant, yet doors for the Gospel are being opened by the Lord, as Khakim's report shows:

I recently visited Andrei's family, who are Roma in nationality. Andrei is ill with HIV and Hepatitis C related to years of drug addiction. He contracted all these diseases while leading an unrighteous life. But Andrei began to understand that he was living sinfully

and that he needed to be changed. Later he started attending our meetings on Sundays and Wednesdays. His father Nikolai battles illnesses, and I shared the Gospel with him many times. This time, I was able to

talk to his wife and shared the Gospel with her. Ruslan, Andrei's relative, is also a drug addict and has

run-ins with the law. I was able to have a good talk with him and shared Christ, telling Ruslan about the true faith and corrected misconceptions that Ruslan had. God's Word has been sown!

Another of my visits was to Raj's family. His wife's name is Lisa. They have six children and the family lives very poorly. In the corner of the main room are hanging many icons, as we see in many homes. Raj and his family were very happy to receive a food gift and were very glad that we came to visit them. I started talking about God and then one of the daughters came up to me. She asked about my faith, and I explained it to her. It turned out that she was attending meetings of the Jehovah's Witnesses cult. She had already learnt some of their false doctrines and I was able to talk to her about it, and provided verses from the Scriptures showing the deity of Christ. We will talk some more with her next time, by God's grace. Praise God for all things!

Indeed, we praise God for these Gospel seeds being planted. Sometimes the soil is hard and the labor can take months, if not years. But the Lord brings the fruit in His time. Pray for Khakim and his faithful, diligent ministry among Russia's Roma.

FAR EAST RUSSIA: God Uses Your Support to Share the Gospel with More Orphans!

Not long ago, we received a wonderful report from the **Khabarovsk region** in Far East Russia. There, SGA-supported *Orphans Reborn* leader Vyacheslav encountered yet another vivid reminder of God's power. His story begins with Christmas outreach:

This past year, we have received more financial assistance than in previous years, and even more than we needed for the children in the three orphanages where we already minister. We accepted this as God's call to work harder!

We resumed praying for the orphanage in another village, asking God to open the doors for us there. However, we were not able to meet with the headmaster of the orphanage before the Christmas holidays as she said the orphanage was on quarantine, and vacations were already scheduled. Instead, she invited us to hold our Christmas program after the holidays. We trusted God, bought gifts, and held the Christmas celebration for the other three orphanages

in the church building. Since we had been refused admission previously at this orphanage, we thought that they worked closely with a local Orthodox church. But we learned that the priest began reducing his activities there, at first just at Easter and Christmas, and after that he stopped showing up at all. As a result of this, we were now allowed to show our Christmas ministry!

A week later, we signed an agreement between our church and the orphanage. From now on, every week the Word of God will be heard in one more place! Everyone who was in the orphanage and even the teacher attended our outreach. We talked about Christmas again. Then we had tea and a long conversation, and the children did not want to let us go.

As we talked, the children seemed very open. They had asked us to come at least a few times a year, and were very happy to find out that we would come on a weekly basis! Afterward, apparently after the director heard about the success of the first meeting, she contacted the pastor of our church and thanked him for a good start of our cooperation, offering even to expand it! We look forward to fruitful cooperation and the expansion of the Kingdom of God in this village and in our region. Thank you for giving us this opportunity!

We praise and thank God for this tremendous open door, and ask Him for His continued blessing on the *Orphans Reborn* team and their ministry. May many young boys and girls come to saving faith as they hear the Gospel! •

Asia, ministry in **Uzbekistan** takes place under **significant opposition.** We recently received a report from a missionary pastor named Andrei, highlighting yet again that God brings about fruit in His time and in His way—sometimes after years of diligent outreach. He shares:

In one local village, thanks to God, services are held regularly two times a week. There are also youth and children's fellowships that take place. We also visit villages nearby. In each, there are people who hear the message of salvation. **Praise God, some people are receiving the Lord there.** This past Christmas and New Year's, many new people visited our services. We pray that God will bring them to Himself. Recently, two new brothers joined the church, thank God!

In mid-December, I visited a seriously sick man whom I had known for a long time. When I met with him earlier, he did not want to listen to anything about God. He considered himself a believer in his own way, but he lived a very sinful life and was not embarrassed by it, but once in a difficult time, he helped us a lot. We lived with him for about 10 days. Before his death, I went to share Christ with him several times, and he managed to reconcile with God

and with his family. We thank God for this, even though he was saved at the last moment as the thief on the cross.

Not long ago there was yet another dying person. He also turned to the Lord while he still lived and had the opportunity. Recently we visited him, and pray that God will help him pass into eternity without doubting Christ. There are people in his life who might attempt to shake his faith. So, please pray with us for him. His name is Zhuma.

For believers like Andrei who are diligent in evangelism and sharing faith in Christ, it can be easy to get discouraged when we don't see immediate results. In the West, we are so accustomed to everything being fast—almost "on demand." Yet things don't often work like that when it comes to matters of faith.

Seeds must be planted, and often cultivated for years before the fruit begins to manifest. As the Word tells us . . . *I planted, Apollos watered, but God was causing the growth* (1 Corinthians 3:6). While Andrei's report doesn't speak of it, the country in which he and his church minister is one of the most oppressive for evangelical believers. Yet the work of the Gospel goes on in the midst of it, and even overcomes. •

"They Do Not Know Where to Go"

How your prayers and gifts point desperate refugees in Belarus to Christ

SGA partners have helped support the Little Pearl camp in Belarus for many years now. Since its beginning, the camp has helped thousands of children with illnesses related to residual radiation from the Chernobyl nuclear disaster, receiving initial diagnostics and limited treatment. But since the invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, the camp has found yet another way to minister the love of Christ by helping fleeing refugees driven out of their homes by the war.

Pavel, the camp director, says that the stories of the refugees are heartbreaking. He says, "The stories often fail to convey the horror of what is happening. It's all the bombing and the fear. And the stories are similar. A woman and a man were among the latest group that came. I could see that they are very confused. They do not know where to go. They came from Ukraine's Kherson region and have no relatives abroad. Their relatives remained behind in Ukraine."

Tatyana was reluctant to give her family's names and it was evident that she was afraid. Since the beginning of the invasion, the troops occupied the best houses. They openly steal washing machines, microwave ovens, refrigerators, and other household appliances. There is nothing the people can do

about it because they are armed. A lot of people die in the constant shelling. A neighboring family of a mother and her daughter decided to hide in the attic of their house, and that is where the shell hit—killing them both.

Piotr Podrez, the director of SGA's Regional Ministry Center (RMC) in Minsk, came to visit Kobrin along with his son Dima, who also works at the RMC. He shared, "I am thankful to God that I had the opportunity to have a meeting with refugees and to witness for Christ. There were 76 of them."

According to Pavel, with each group of refugees that comes in, there is a one-hour meeting to instruct them on how to move across the border and abroad. The hope of the Gospel is also shared with them as the most important matter of all. Please join us in lifting these men, women, and children in prayer, praying that as they seek peace in the midst of war, they will find the true peace of Christ that . . . surpasses all understanding (Philippians 4:6). •

Celebrating Your Support of Retiring 70-Year SGA Missionary Florence Daneliuk!

n January 31 of this year, long-time SGA missionary Florence Daneliuk retired after serving on the mission field for more than 70 years—the last 58 of them in Kodiak, Alaska. Florence has been facing some ongoing health issues, and decided that the time

for retirement had now come.

Florence arrived in Kodiak in 1965, yet her ministry with Slavic Gospel Association began much earlier with her late husband Andrew in refugee work after World War II. After Andrew's untimely passing in an auto accident, the Lord led Florence with two small children to go and work in Kodiak.

Florence spoke Ukrainian fluently, and was deeply involved in ministry to ladies and transient Coast Guard families through Kodiak Bible Church, which was originally an SGA church plant. In the earlier days of our mission, SGA had several missionaries in Alaska ministering to Russian visitors, sailors, and business people. Florence managed apartments in Kodiak for years, and held regular Bible studies with individuals and families passing through. By God's grace, Florence and her ministry truly impacted hundreds of lives for Christ, and we trust that she will continue to do so even in retirement—in the Lord's service, no one is ever truly retired!

SGA's board of directors, President Michael Johnson, and the rest of the SGA family are thankful for Florence and her decades of faithful service to Christ. We also are deeply thankful to the Lord for all the SGA partners through the years who steadfastly and generously supported Florence's ministry. •
